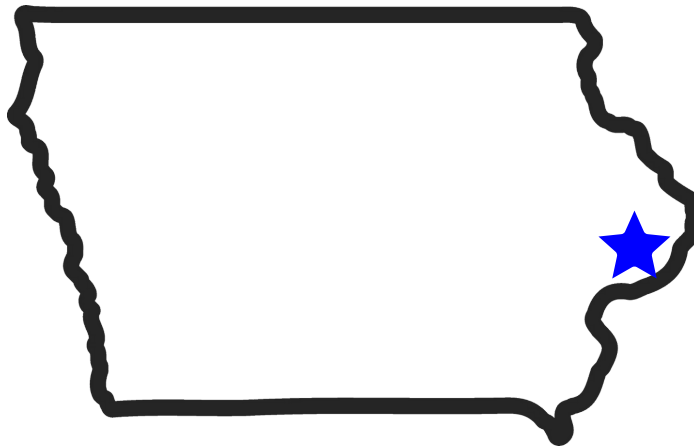

OATH OF OFFICE & CODE OF ETHICS

1. ETHICS/CODE OF CONDUCT

The Eldridge Police Department exists because the community, through government, empowers the police department to do a job on its behalf. The police department and its employees are tasked to function effectively, partly through personal endeavors and commitment to the profession, but primarily because the community has faith and confidence in our ability to accomplish the task of enforcing the laws of the land and responding to community concerns in an honest and impartial manner.

The citizens of Eldridge are entitled to expect:

- A police department that is beyond reproach in matters of integrity.
 - Impartial and courteous services.
- Open and honest communication that encourages trust.
- Responsible and accountable management of police department resources.

The policy of the department is to ensure that all employees maintain an exemplary standard of personal integrity and ethical conduct in their relationships with other employees and the community.

2. LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS CODE OF ETHICS

The Law Enforcement Officer, my fundamental duty is to serve mankind, to safeguard lives and property, and to protect the innocent against deception, the weak against oppression or intimidation, and the peaceful against violence or disorder, and to respect the Constitutional rights of all people to liberty, equality, and justice.

I will keep my private life unsullied as an example to all, maintain courageous calm in the face of danger, scorn, or ridicule, develop self-restraint, and be constantly mindful for the welfare of others. Honest in thought and deed in both my personal and official life, I will be exemplary in obeying the laws of the land and the regulations of my department. Whatever I see or hear of a confidential nature or that is confided to me in my official capacity, will be kept ever secret unless revelation is necessary in performance of my duty.

I will never act officiously or permit personal feelings, prejudices, animosities, or friendships to influence my decisions. With no compromise for crime and with relentless prosecution of criminals, I will enforce the law courteously and appropriately without fear or favor, malice, or ill will, never employing unnecessary force or violence and never accepting gratuities.

I recognize the badge of my office as a symbol of public faith, and I accept it as public trust to be held so long as I am true to the ethics of the police service. I will constantly strive to achieve these objectives and ideals, dedicating myself to my chosen profession – Law Enforcement.

I am both blessed and honored to be a part of this great organization. Each member of the Eldridge Police Department believes in the powerful commitment to “SERVE ALL AND PROTECT ALL.” We believe our obligation to improve our community’s quality of life includes remaining compassionate and empathic to everyone. This annual report provides a snapshot of the great work of all of our officers and our plans to become a “Premier Law Enforcement Agency in Iowa.” Our goal is to be the best at providing our community services that improve your quality of life. We have developed a mission statement, vision statement, and core values that support our oath we recite on our first day with the Eldridge Police Department: “We will support the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of the State of Iowa, and the Ordinances of the City of

Eldridge, Iowa, and that we will faithfully and impartially, to the best of our ability, discharge all the duties of the Office of Police Officer, in the City of Eldridge, Iowa, as now or hereafter required by law.”

I want to personally thank you for taking the time to learn more about your police department. Transparency is a key component of establishing and maintaining a strong relationship with the community. Our annual report is one of the ways we share information with the public, something we have added to our department in 2021. Within this year’s report, you will find information about our community involvement, training, and much more.

Community engagement continues to be a high priority at the Eldridge Police Department. In 2022, we hosted our first National Night Out at Sheridan Meadows Park and Movie Night at the North Scott Football Field.

National Night Out was attended by nearly 1,500 children and adults and the movie night was attended by nearly 100 children and adults. We will continue partnering with our local businesses and citizens to create more community events. The department will be working on hosting National Night Out in 2023 along with a golf outing, coffee with a cop, and movie night.

Our School Resource Officer (SRO) continues to work with the North Scott Community School District in building stronger relationships with the students and enhancing the security of our schools. Our department along with Iowa State Patrol hosted Advanced Law Enforcement Rapid Response Training (ALERT) for our department and surrounding law enforcement agencies to better prepare law enforcement in the event of an active shooter incident. We also hosted a symposium at the North Scott High School with Iowa State Patrol. This training is a continued education from the ALERT training for our educators and school administrators. School educators and administrators went through several hours of lectures and hands-on training from law enforcement.

Our department began the process of creating our first K9 program which is planned to go active after the 1st of July 2023. We continue to look for and apply for State, Federal, and Local Grants which help support the department in purchasing newer and more advanced equipment and continued education/training for our officers. Our officers continue to strive for greatness along with following the department's mission statement, vision statement, and core values.

We continue to look for ways in which to connect with our residents and visitors to our city. On December 23, 2022, EL106 Officer Robert Haxton retired from the Eldridge Police Department after nearly 9 years of service to the City of Eldridge.

While those in the military stand as soldiers of freedom, police officers stand as soldiers of the constitution of their individual states and communities. One does not easily make the choice to enlist in the military, choosing to write a blank check payable to the United States of America for the amount up to and including giving their life for

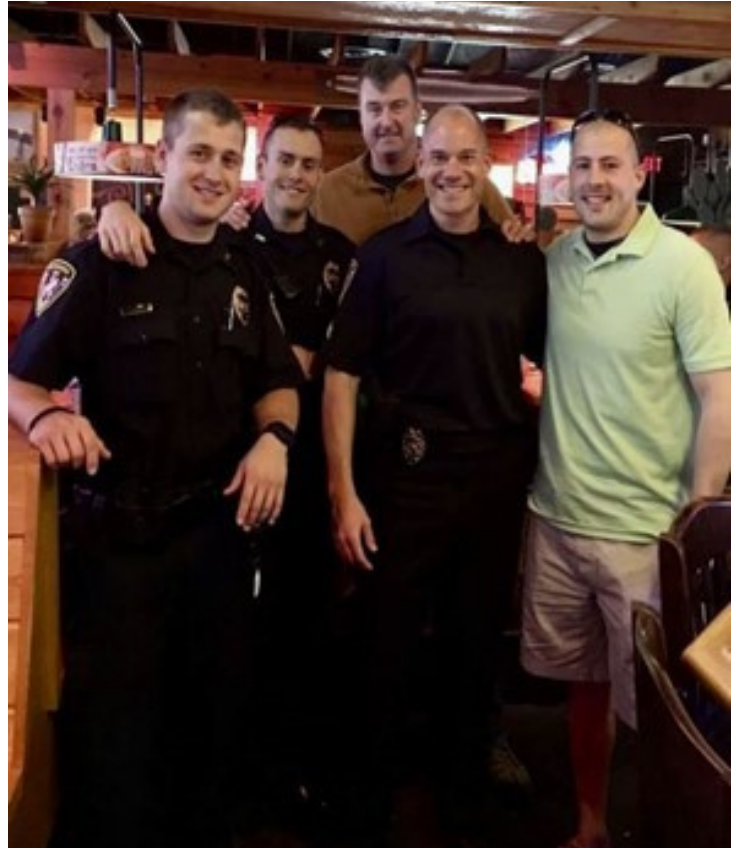

Robert's desire to serve did not end with his military career. Robert joined the Eldridge Police Department in January 2014 to serve his community. During the course of Robert's law enforcement career with the Eldridge Police Department, he served as the department's firearms instructor and field training officer along with completing crisis intervention training. Robert was awarded two Commendation Medals along with receiving the Professional Service Award at the time of his retirement. Robert dedicated nearly nine years of service as an Eldridge Police Officer to the City of Eldridge, Iowa, and its citizens.



I personally will cherish and value the years I had the pleasure to serve with Robert and will hold our friendship close for the remainder of our lives. The officers with the Eldridge Police Department (past and present) will remember their friendship they developed with Robert along with the memory of Robert's dedication and commitment to serve as a Police Officer.

We thank you for your service, professionalism, dedication not only as a Police Officer but your service as a United States Army Veteran, and your friendship. We congratulate you on your retirement and wish you and your family all the best in the future.

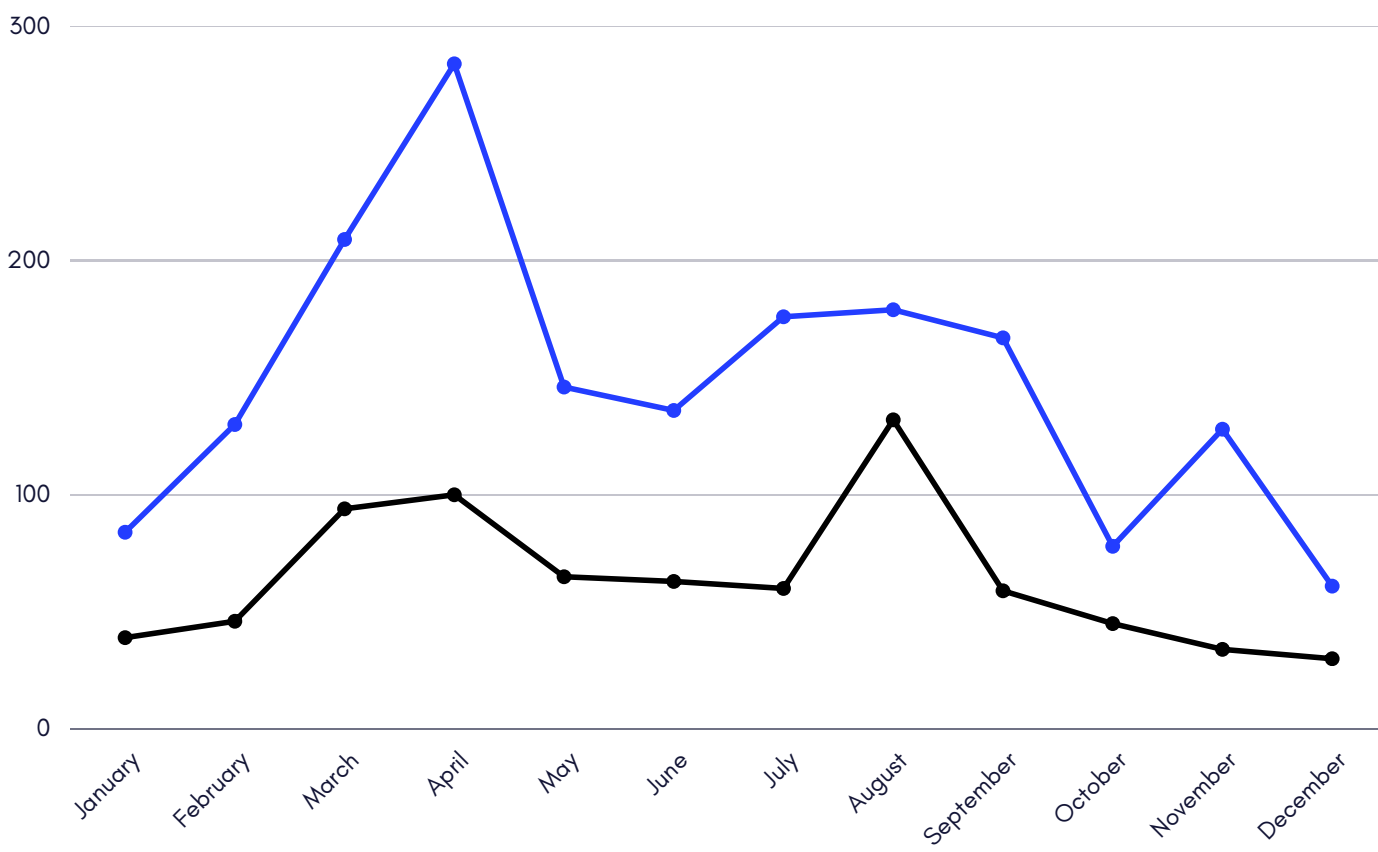

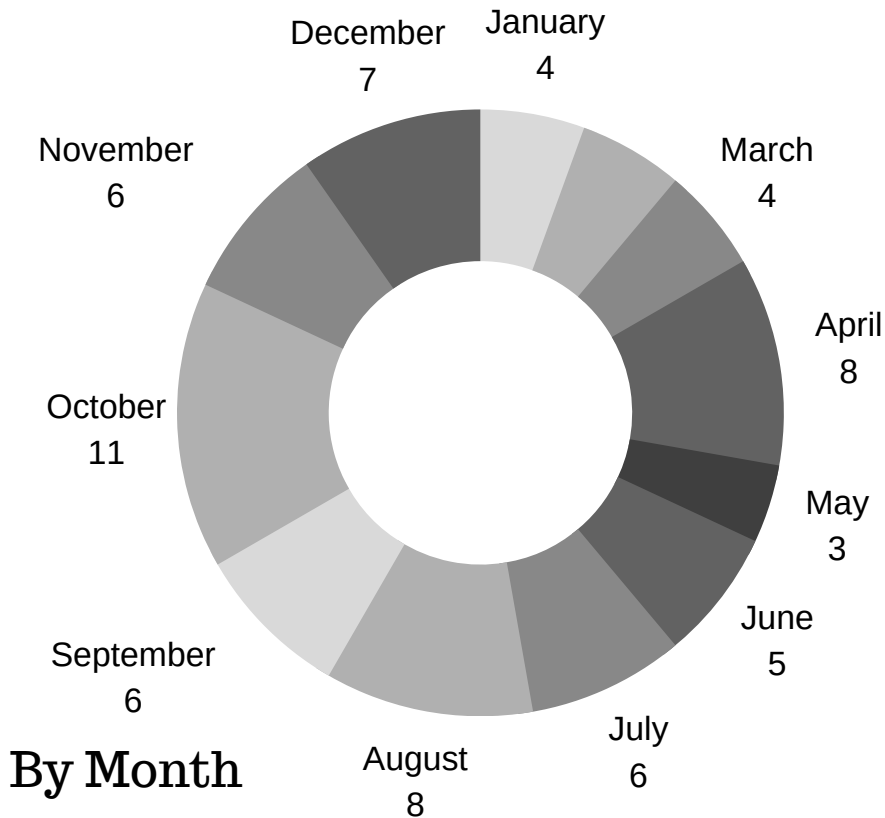

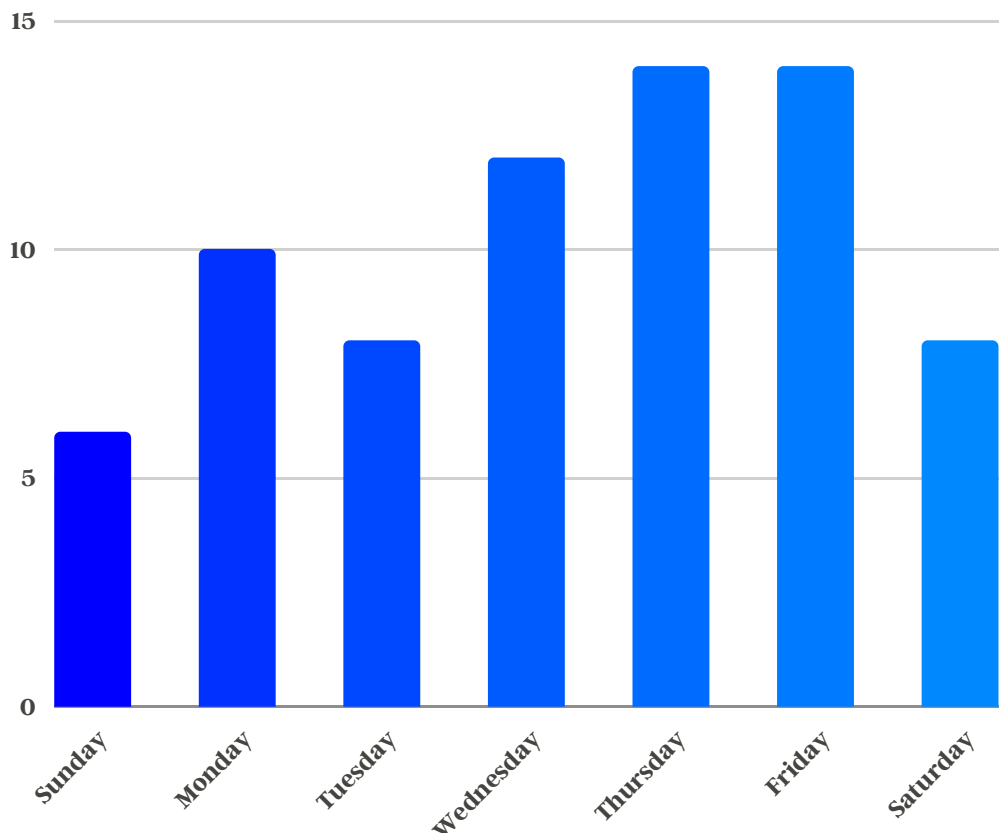


Accidents

By Weekdays

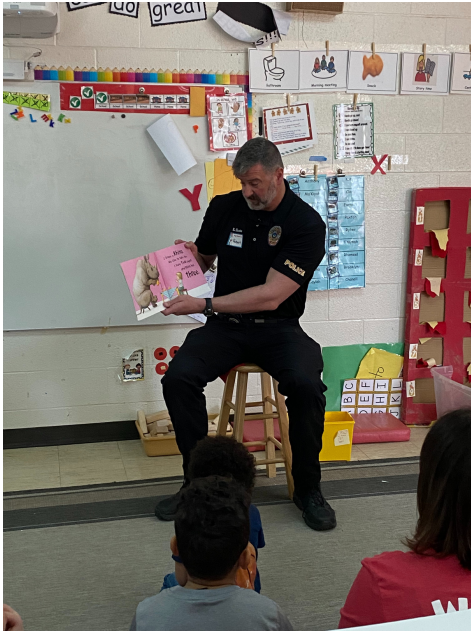

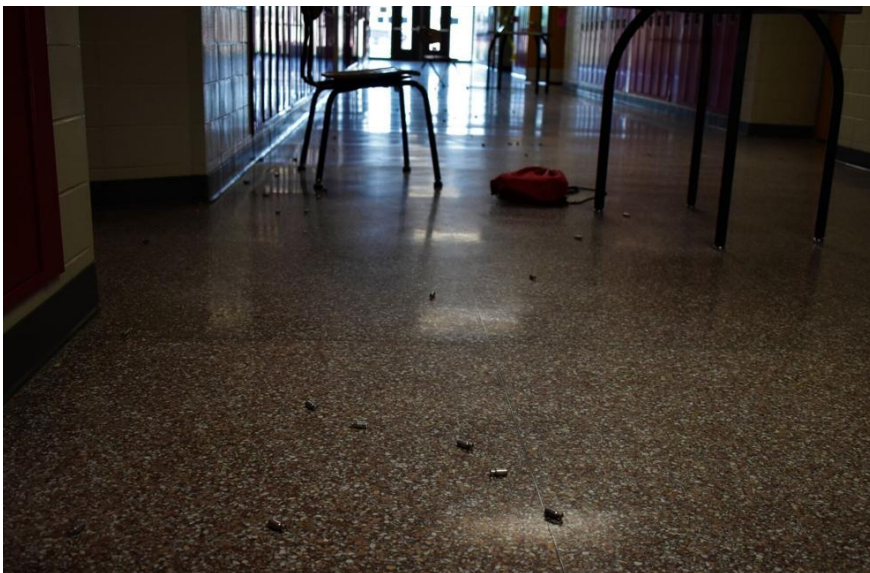

The Eldridge Police Department hosted its first National Night Out on August 2nd. National Night Out is bringing law enforcement and its communities closer in order to build stronger relationships and to make our communities a safer place to live.

The Eldridge Police Department also received numerous donations from all over the Quad Cities along with a silent auction to raise money for the department's first ever K9 program. The Eldridge Police Department was extremely successful in not only building a stronger relationship with the community, but the department received a large support in moving forward in building a K9 program by raising \$30,054.40. Since National Night Out, the department has received several other donations from around the Quad Cities in support of our future K9 program (end of year total \$62,718.23). Our goal is to earn \$100,000 before July 1, 2023, at which time the department will be able to move forward with the K9 program. The department cannot thank our community and the Quad Cities enough for their support.



National Night Out featured Police K9 demonstrations by local police departments, emergency vehicle tours of every kind from firetrucks, ambulances, police vehicles, and med force helicopter, Rapunzel, the Little Mermaid and a Jedi from Dreams Come True Princess Parties, Vince and Larry Crash Test Dummies from the Iowa Governor's Office of Traffic Safety, Iowa Ghost Busters, Storm Troopers from the Korriban Squad will raid the night, Spider-Man from the Iowa League of Heroes, Chase from Paw Patrol, QC Storm's Radar, McGruff the Crime Fighting Dog, and Sparky the Fire Dog. There were bounce houses, face painting, an impaired driving awareness obstacle course and a seatbelt convincer ride. Oh and lots of food and soda and lemonade shakeups along with KONA ICE and SIPs.

The event was closed out with a large fireworks show.





Officer Skocinski represented the Eldridge Police Department at Texas Roadhouse in April along with several other law enforcement agencies in Scott County to raise money for the Special Olympics Iowa. This event alone raised \$3,687.45 for the Special Olympics.
